



A Bear Called Paddington – Michael Bond

A classic book. Good clear prose style. Each chapter forms a stand-alone story – perfect for newly confident readers. Individual stories are used in our school curriculum.



Mr Bunny's Chocolate Factory – Elys Dolan

The winner of the 2018 Laugh Out Loud Award. Mr Bunny, a chocolate capitalist, starts putting profits before poultry. Looks at the world of work and the need for fairness. Very funny with detail in the illustrations to pore over.

Everywhere Bear – Julia Donaldson

The Story begins in a Year 1 classroom before taking us on an exciting journey. Good for imagination.

I Am Henry Finch – Alexis Deacon

An award – winning picture book about courage and making a difference. An inspirational book – also very funny.

Once Upon a Wild Wood – Chris Riddell

A story packed full of familiar fairy tale characters as you've never seen them before. Full of warmth and humour.

Sheep Pig – Dick King Smith

Short chapters make this an ideal book for early confident readers. A humorous, animal tale. The basis for the film 'Babe'
