- Diwali is the Festival of Lights. Hindus celebrate the triumphant return of their Gods; Rama and Sita, after their 14-year exile. Many lights and oil lamps are lit on the streets and in houses.



- There is colour all around us in the natural world. Leaves change colour in Autumn and rainbows are seen when the sun shines through water droplets.



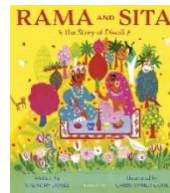
- Red, blue and yellow are called primary colours. We can make new colours by mixing these together.

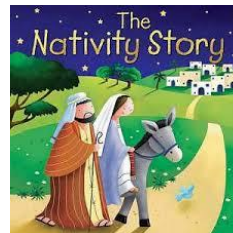

Primary Colour	Red, yellow, or blue which can be mixed together to make other colours.
Diwali	A Hindu festival with lights.
Diva Lamp	An oil lamp which is lit to celebrate Diwali.
Decoration	Adding something to make an object look more beautiful.
Firework	Explosives made of chemicals and paper, which produce light and sound to make patterns in the sky.
Christmas	A Christian festival celebrating the birth of Jesus.
Nativity	The story of Jesus' birth.
