The first page gives important dates and information as well as showing which topic children are studying that half term. Following this are the tasks that should be completed by the end of the term.

Cross Curricular Tasks have been designed to enable all children the opportunity to apply their learning and showcase their talents in other areas of the curriculum.

Cross Curricular Tasks

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- Find out how to say the numbers 1 10 in Spanish. Can you recite them? Fring your home learning into achieve to
- Find out about a national dish. Which country does it come from? What are the ingredients? When is it eaten?
- · Interview your family, have they visited other countries? Where did they go? What did they do? Bring photos or souvenirs in to share with the class.
- · Find a story set in another country or culture and bring it in to school to share with the class.
- Choose a continent and create a travel brochure -record facts, maps, flags and pictures using Atlases, the Internet and books to help. Get a template from your teacher.
- Make a paper mache globe ask your teacher for a set of instructions.

Completed cross curricular tasks should be brought to school each week in the red reading bags. We celebrate the work the children undertake at home.

Cross Curricular Tasks

- Ideally we would like children to complete 1 cross curricular task each week.
- There are enough planned tasks to accommodate this.
- The optional extras have been designed for those children who have extra time or the desire to undertake more tasks.

Mathletics at Key Stage 1

The aims for using Mathletics:



- For the children to feel more confident with their Maths ability in solving calculations and working through problems.
- •To be able to consolidate their Maths strategies and identify any gaps in their learning.
- •To reinforce the topics covered in school.
- •If children want to do more they can try Mathletics live.
- •If you feel the level of challenge in the questions seems to easy for your child, let us know and we can alter the level for you.

Reading at Key Stage 1

- In Key Stage 1 we would like all children to read to an adult for at least 5 minutes per evening.
- It is important to encourage and support your child to use their phonics to read new or unfamiliar words by segmenting the word into its component sounds (phonemes) and then blending the sounds together fully to read the whole word.

It is important that we all model the correct use of pure sounds when decoding words Eg 't' not 'ter'

Helping with phonics

- By the end of the month we aim to send home a phonics keyring with your child that contains all the phonemes that your child has been taught so far.
- On the back of each sound (phoneme) will be an example word to help you model the correct pronunciation of each sound (phoneme) within a word.
- In school, children apply their increasing phonic knowledge to read both real and nonsense words.

Helping with tricky words

- To accompany each phonics phase taught, there are a group of tricky words which can't be sounded out that children have to learn to read.
- We will also be sending home sets of tricky words on flashcards with your child for you to help them learn to read (and spell).
- Eg Phase 3 tricky words
- At the end, we have included suggestions for games to play



Red book bags

- Children should bring their red book bags into school every day so they are available for extra reading at any point during the day. We try to squeeze in as much reading as we can!
- Reading books will be changed at least once a week (on a Wednesday), with free reader books available for changing on a Monday and Friday.
- Library books will be changed with a parent volunteer every Wednesday.



Home/school Reading Books

- It is important for early stage readers to re-read their books as many times as possible.
- 1st Read to decode new words
- 2^{nd} Read to remember new words
- 3^{rd} Read to practice new words
- 4th Read or more to read for fluency, meaning and to develop expression.



Helping your child whilst Reading

It is also important to:-



- Ask questions about what your child has read (or what you have read to them).
- Question and discuss new or unknown vocabulary.
- Encourage your child to explain their opinions and express their feelings about books they have read (or listened to).
- Predict what might happen next, based on what has been read so far.
- Read (or listen) to a range of text types fictions, non-fiction, poetry, plays, leaflets, posters, signs etc.







- A bedtime story routine is a great way to provide your children with the opportunity to listen and grow to love a wide variety of books as well as happy memories of time close to you.
- The level of books used can be beyond what your child may be able to independently read.









Spelling in school at Key Stage 1

- After much consideration the children in KS1 will no longer have a formal weekly spelling test.
- Instead teachers will assess children's application of spellings and spelling rules during daily English and phonics lessons.
- If you know that your child finds spelling tricky, or they are finding a particular spelling pattern tricky, try to learn 3 words initially, and then 5 and more if you can.
- As an extra challenge encourage your child to apply their spellings by writing them in sentences.

Spelling homework at Key Stage 1

- Our spelling lists link with the requirements of the National Curriculum for KS1.
- Children are required to be able to spell words from the list of common exception words for their year group and all of the previous year groups.
- This week, we will be sending home spelling mats with the Y1 or Y1/Y2 common exception words (that don't follow the usual spelling rules) on. These are the words the National Curriculum expects children to be able to spell confidently at the end of each year group.
- We recognise that some children may find this easy and some will find this much harder
