Promoting British Values - Maths

<u>Subject</u>: Maths

	How are British values promoted through Maths?
Democracy	 Democratic process for election of School Council, Eco/Energy monitors, Playground Buddies. Pupil voice questionnaires and interviews to gather opinions Visit from LA re congestion and safety - planning/problem solving.
Rule of Law	 Encourage a positive ethos where children observe other individuals methods of exploration, knowing the right and wrong ways of encouraging peers to develop mathematically. Behaviour sanctions/steps - clear rewards and sanctions. Knowing that behaviour affects our rights and the rights of others. Maths games - playing fairly and by the rules.
Individual Liberty	 To develop tolerance and resilience through problem solving and understanding of concepts, encouraging children to persevere and try different methods to arrive at the correct solutions. Children are allowed to make mistakes and learn from them. This fosters confidence and builds self-esteem, encouraging children to become lifelong learners. Extra-curricular activities - tuck shop, fundraising events etc where children feel they can make a positive contribution. Maths games and home learning opportunities. Maths competitions (KS2) Tuck shop
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Mutual Respect	 Every student has the right to learn, every teacher has the right to teach. We all have the right to feel safe and to be treated with dignity and respect. They are encouraged to respect the opinions and beliefs of others when discussing maths. Children often work in pairs or groups where they learn to work with others and understand how different people solve problems in different ways.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	 Children are encouraged to think critically, caringly, creatively and collaboratively to build a community of enquiry where they learn how to learn and face new challenges positively. Children are encouraged to acquire an appreciation of and a respect for their own and other cultures in a way that promotes tolerance and harmony between different cultural traditions. They respect the opinions and beliefs of others when discussing maths and they listen to each other, sharing ideas. They learn the origins of maths and that it comes from different cultures e.g. when discussing famous mathematicians. Children also study maths through cross curricular links e.g. Indian Rangoli patterns, Maths games e.g. linked to Hanukkah.





Promoting British Values - Science

Subject: Science

	How are British values promoted through Science?
Democracy	 Democratic process for electing members of the Eco Council. 'Pupil Voice' - interviews and questionnaires to gather opinions of the children in relation to Science at WKPS. Outcomes acted upon, where possible.
Rule of Law	 Discussions about scientists having to follow the laws of our country when they are doing research. Link to the need for 'fair testing' - if you don't follow the rules of 'fair testing' the results cannot be trusted, likewise society needs to follow its rules.
Individual Liberty	 Participation in extra-curricular clubs (e.g. Mad Science). The pupils are given the freedom to make choices based on their interests.
Mutual Respect	 Evaluating the work of their peers and giving positive and constructive feedback. Celebration and acknowledgment of British scientists in modern times and throughout history. Working together, in groups, to investigate a scientific
Tolerance of those	 concept, allowing all to participate and contribute. Acknowledge that some beliefs have an impact on science (e.g. creationism) and provide the children with a

Promoting British Values - PE

Subject : PE

	How are British values promoted through PE?
Democracy	 Democratic process for identifying sports monitors. Pupil voice - interviews and questionnaires to gather opinions of the children in relation to PE at WKPS and outcomes acted upon where possible.
Rule of Law	 Rules of sports games and the importance of adhering to these rules especially when playing as a team. Competing against other schools fairly - promote 'fair play' Play leaders - teaching younger children playground games and rules.
Individual Liberty	 Participation in extra-curricular clubs and opportunities, pupils are given the freedom to make choices based on their interests. Charitable work - Sports Relief
Mutual Respect	 Evaluating the work of their peers and giving positive and constructive feedback. Celebration and acknowledgment of British sports role models.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	 Exploring dance from other faiths and cultures. Inclusion of all in PE lessons, extra-curricular activities and on the playground.





Promoting British Values - **History**

<u>Subject</u>: History

	How are British values promoted through History?
Democracy	 Pupil voice - interviews and questionnaires to gather opinions of the children in relation to History at WKPS and outcomes acted upon where possible. The children are given the opportunity to find out about a wide range of historical events, allowing them to gain an understanding of chronology. We compare how democracy has changed over time.
Rule of Law	We consider how life has changed for people.
Individual Liberty	Children engage in debates, allowing freedom of speech.
Mutual Respect	We might develop awareness and appreciation of other cultures and historical events through time.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	We approach historical events sensitively, bearing in mind children with different faiths and beliefs.





Promoting British Values - Geography

Subject: Geography

	How are British values promoted through Geography?
Democracy	 Pupil voice - interviews and questionnaires to gather opinions of the children in relation to Geography at WKPS and outcomes acted upon where possible. In Geography we consider a range of viewpoints within society and effects from natural disasters.
Rule of Law	The Eco-councillors created a list of rules to ensure we look after the school environment.
Individual Liberty	We allow the children to consider and contribute to the school environment and the wider community.
Mutual Respect	The children are expected to demonstrate respect for their environment and understand why it is important e.g. energy monitors and Eco-councillors.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	 We allow children to voice their opinions with equality for all faiths and beliefs. We approach geographical events sensitively, bearing in mind children with different faiths and beliefs.





Promoting British Values - R.E

 $\underline{\textbf{Subject}}: R.E$

	How are British values promoted through R.E?
Democracy	 The children are given the opportunity to find out about a wide range of faiths and religions, allowing them to make their own decisions. We compare how democracy has changed over time. Pupil voice - interviews and questionnaires to gather opinions of the children in relation to RE at WKPS and outcomes acted upon where possible.
Rule of Law	During Religious Education rules for particular faiths are thought about.
Individual Liberty	We allow the children to express their views in a respectful manner.
Mutual Respect	We might develop awareness and appreciation of other cultures.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	 Within class faiths are respected, recognised and shared. We celebrate the wide range of faiths, beliefs and religions at West Kirby Primary School.





Promoting British Values - **PSHE**

Subject : PSHE

	How are British values promoted through PSHE ?
Democracy	 School Council (&Eco Council) - pupils have the opportunity to have their voices heard in matters that relate directly to them. The elections of class council members are based on pupil votes. Pupil voice - interviews and questionnaires to gather opinions of the children in relation to PSHE at WKPS. Outcomes acted upon where possible.
Rule of Law	 WKPS Code of Conduct - the importance of Laws/rules (class, school, country) are consistently reinforced across the school through class/school behaviour zones and sanction steps. These are reinforced through class and whole school assemblies.
	 Children's efforts are praised informally, individually, during group work, in front of the whole class and the whole school. Children are rewarded not only for achievement in curriculum areas, but for positive behaviour and general adherence to WKPS 'Code of Conduct'.
	 Rewards are given in the form of being 'A Star' for the day, stickers and team points. Children's achievements are also recognised during Friday's Celebration Assembly.
	 Pupils are taught the value and reasons behind laws - that they govern and protect us and the responsibilities that this involves.
	 Visits during whole school assemblies from authorities such as the Police; Fire Service; Coastguard, Merseyrail regarding safety/reasons for laws and consequences for breaking them.
Individual Liberty	 All pupils are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing they are in a safe and supportive environment. We provide boundaries for our children to make choices safely, through the provision of a safe environment and planned curriculum.
	Through our E-Safety and PSHE lessons pupils are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedoms and are advises how to do so safely.

Mutual Respect	 Pupils are taught to respect each other, and adults, and to base their behaviour on empathy towards others. They learn that everyone is different but everyone is equally important. Respect for others is reiterated through our 'Code of Conduct', 'Sanction Steps', 'Behaviour Zones' and Behaviour policy. As a school we help children to develop their awareness of people's differences and similarities, and to value the rich diversity of the human race. Pupils are encouraged to evaluating the work of their peers and give positive and constructive feedback.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	 Festivals and traditions from different faiths are explored and celebrated across the school, through RE and PSHE lessons and through whole school assemblies. This enhances pupils understanding of their place in a culturally diverse society, and gives them opportunities to experience such diversity. Pupils are encouraged to share experiences of their own faiths, traditions and festivals to enhance learning within classes and the whole school.





Promoting British Values - Computing

 $\underline{\textbf{Subject}}: \textit{C}omputing$

	How are British values promoted through Computing?
Democracy	The importance of making democratic decisions is highlighted when children work in groups, such as when producing a group powerpoint.
Rule of Law	 Children must respect the variety of computing and technology equipment they use. Rules are established for using equipment and being safe online, that are revisited at the start of each lesson.
Individual Liberty	 Independent working, allowing freedom of creativity, is evident in many computing tasks, for example: editing photographs and desktop publishing.
Mutual Respect	Children are encouraged to show respect to each other when evaluating/peer assessing work. Children have recently completed coding tasks where they evaluated each other's 'car runs'.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	Children research faiths such Judaism, Sikhism and Hinduism, in written word, images and video.





Promoting British Values - Music

Subject : Music

	How are British values promoted through Music?
Democracy	 Pupil voice - choice of music and opportunities to express opinions about music. Children experience a variety of music from around the world.
Rule of Law	 Helping each other to keep to agreed ideas in musical compositions. Following the rules of music to play a part in succeeding as a group. Following a conductor.
Individual Liberty	 Planning and taking part in class assemblies, end of year production. Extra-curricular clubs, recorders, orchestra, singing. Freedom to make choices based on preferences e.g. part singing, 2-part recorder pieces, choice of orchestral instrument.
Mutual Respect	 Study of British composers and their influence worldwide. Children's individual achievements in and out of school are recognised through Celebration and Class Assemblies. Regular performances to celebrate musical achievements of groups of children learning to play an instrument. Other children in school listen, respect and value the achievements of others.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	 Assemblies (whole school, key stage and class) include songs that complement and promote British Values with themes such as remembrance, World wars, as well as stories and celebrations from world religions.





Promoting British Values - Art

<u>Subject</u>: ART

	How are British values promoted through Art?
Democracy	 In group art projects, children experience the need to work together democratically, choosing the focus of their project and deciding as a team how the tasks will be organised. The value of the democratic system is demonstrated by the positive outcome of teamwork. Children are encouraged to recognise how they can improve their own skills and help develop those in others by collaborative learning and assessment opportunities.
Rule of Law	 Within Art lessons, children are taught to respect the rule of law by learning to respect the equipment, such as the correct use of brushes and other resources. Children are taught about safety issues around scissors, craft knives and glue guns, for example.
Individual Liberty	 In Art, children experience the freedom to express themselves as individuals in the choices they make when creating their artwork. They are actively encouraged to discuss and evaluate
	the effects of these and are able to celebrate their freedom to demonstrate their right as individuals to see things from different perspectives.
Mutual Respect	 Children's art projects encourage awareness and celebration of the diversity of our global and local community. Children and their families are encouraged to engage with the language and cultures represented and enhance our displays and learning opportunities through multilingual displays and artwork reflecting the richness of the identities of our community. We take part in the West Kirby Lantern Parade, which involves children creating the lanterns with the help of members from the local community and helps to bring people together in a parade of peace and light.
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	Children are encouraged to engage with and appreciate art from different cultures and to use art in cross-curricular activities, which include creating artwork reflecting different beliefs and cultures, such as Diwali lamps, stained glass windows and Aboriginal art.





Promoting British Values - DT

 $\underline{\textbf{Subject}}: \mathsf{DT}$

	How are British values promoted through DT?
Democracy	 Questionnaire used to find out what children through the school think and feel about DT DT requires a lot of teamwork including democratic decision making
Rule of Law	 Children are told that they must respect the equipment we use Rules are reinforced during DT sessions and it is explained that the rules are there to keep the children safe
Individual Liberty	 Children are given planning time during their DT sessions to make choices as to their designs Children are encouraged to create their own piece of work showcasing their individuality
Mutual Respect	 Children are encouraged to self-evaluate and to evaluate with others- keeping in mind that their comments and thoughts can have an effect on others Children are encouraged to give constructive criticism and to always find a positive in the work of their peers
Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs	 Our topics include making Diwali lamps and we have also made Hanukkah dreidel For Chinese New Year of the snake we created a large snake which is now displayed in one of our corridors using a range of materials We have also previously created a large Chinese dragon
