- The Equator is an imaginary line that goes around the middle of the Earth.
- Hot countries are close to the Equator.
- The Earth is separated into two Hemispheres. North of the Equator is the Northern Hemisphere and south of the Equator is the Southern Hemisphere.





There are five oceans and seven continents in the world.



- Around 90% of the ice on Earth is found in Antarctica.
- The South Pole is found in Antarctica and the North Pole is found in the Artic.
- Penguins live in Antarctica and polar bears live in the Artic.
- Many animals that live in the desert are nocturnal. They hide out in burrows during the day and come out at night when it is cooler.
- Camels have two rows of eyelashes to protect their eyes from dust and sand.





# Hot and Cold Places - Geography Focus

 An oasis is a place in a desert where water comes up to the surface from deep underground. Trees and other plants grow around an oasis, and animals come to drink water, eat the plants and find shade.



- Rainforests are located near the Equator and can have up to 300 different types of trees.
- The Sahara Desert is located in northern Africa, spanning 12 different countries.
- Sloths spend most of their time in the trees. Their hooked claws and long arms allow them to spend most of their time hanging upside down.
