


What century were the Tudors in?		<p>Henry VIII</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">Henry VIII was born on 28 June 1491 in London, at Greenwich Palace.He became king when his father, Henry VII, died in 1509.He lived at Hampton Court Palace.Just before Henry VIII became king, he married Catherine of Aragon.Henry VIII grew up as a Catholic, but established the Protestant Church of EnglandHenry VIII married four more times – he had six wives in total.From his six marriages, Henry VIII only had three children who lived. Each of them, in turn, ruled England after <u>he</u> died.He enjoyed being outdoors and getting exercise. He loved hunting, playing games like tennis, dancing, and reading – he also loved eating, and became very fat as he got older and couldn't exercise as much.Henry VIII was very well dressed, and wore velvet robes with gold trim and jewels.He died in 1547, and is buried at Windsor Castle next to Jane Seymour.																											
<p>The Tudor period is the period between 1485 and 1603. This was when the Tudors were the ruling family in England.</p> <p>The first Tudor monarch was King Henry VII who claimed the throne when his forces defeated Richard III at the Battle of Bosworth on 22nd August 1485. He ruled until his death in 1509.</p> <p>The Tudor Rose was created when Henry VII brought an end to the War of the Roses (an ongoing battle between two royal groups – The House of Lancaster and the House of York. He joined the White Rose of York with the Red Rose of Lancaster, creating the Union Rose (or the Tudor Rose), which is still used as the floral emblem of England today.</p> <p>Following his father's death, Henry VIII became King of England in 1509 and ruled until his death in 1547.</p>				<p>Vocabulary Dozen</p> <table><tr><td>Monarch / Monarchy</td><td>A leader of a country, such as a King, Queen or Emperor</td></tr><tr><td>Reign</td><td>The period of time while a King or Queen is in power.</td></tr><tr><td>Empire</td><td>A group of lands or countries ruled by a single monarch.</td></tr><tr><td>Medieval</td><td>Relating to the Middle Ages (usually 1066-1485)</td></tr><tr><td>Dissolution of the Monasteries</td><td>The act of separating, or splitting up the church.</td></tr><tr><td>Reformation</td><td>The act of changing (reforming) something. 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<p>Rich V Poor</p> <p>The poor had to work hard in order to survive. They had to work six days a week and only had holy days off work. Punishments for crime were brutal whereas the rich lived privileged lives. Rich people also carried a little bag of herbs to keep unwanted odours at bay.</p>	<p>Living as a Tudor Child</p> <p>Long hours studying and working didn't stop Tudor children having fun. Toys were often made from materials which were easily available. Pig bladders were blown up for footballs. Hoops were made from old barrels. Pebbles were used to play marbles or jacks.</p>	<p>Henry VIII's Wives</p> <p>Most people remember him for having six different wives.</p> 																											
<p>Life in towns</p> <p>90% of the people lived in towns and villages. Towns also had market places. Streets were crowded and filthy. There were no proper drains and people threw rubbish into the street. The dirt attracted rats which spread disease.</p>	<p>Cures and remedies.</p> <p>A Tudor apothecary was the Tudors version of a pharmacist, selling medicine and remedies.
